Born from the desire to help academics and cultural actors embed sustainability in their practice, the Academy is now the leading annual event for educators, researchers, managers and practitioners who wish to create sustainable futures through culture. We facilitate exchange and insight through our pillars:

- **Enhancing** knowledge, skills and competences in the field of sustainable management and policy;
- **Exchanging** mutual learning and sharing good practices for educators and practitioners;
- **Energizing** the cultural management and policy community to be key actors in a sustainable future.



ENCATC has been creating and delivering the academies for over 10 years, in collaboration with Goldsmiths, University of London, pioneers in cultural relations policy, and alongside local partners. The 2025 edition of the Academy will bring together academics, cultural operators, and policy makers to develop the skills and abilities needed to face common challenges and create new and innovative approaches to sustainability in the cultural sector. It will offer a unique opportunity to engage in mutual and collaborative learning with cultural relations organizations, policy makers, and individual experts, seeking to create new knowledge for a more sustainable future.

The work of the ENCATC Academy goes far beyond the days of the event itself. By stimulating peer learning, the exchange of best practices, and shared reflections on challenges and their potential solutions, the Academy sets the foundations for ongoing endeavours by cultural institutions, academics and individual professionals, enabling productive connections for further collaborations. Participants of the Academy will leave not only with more knowledge and skills, but also with much more potential for effective and successful initiatives.

2025 ACADEMY AT A GLANCE



Thanks to the 13th edition of the ENCATC Academy, participants will examine the evolving approaches of funders and institutions in integrating sustainability into their strategies, analyzing how public and private funding bodies are adapting to support environmentally responsible cultural projects. The Academy will also provide insights into the sustainability challenges faced by heritage sites, focusing on the complexities of implementing ecological policies while maintaining cultural integrity. Participants will also engage in reflective exercises, such as assessing their own mobility patterns and discussing ways to adopt more sustainable travel habits. The role of cultural governance in climate action will be a key theme, with discussions on the most recent policy initiatives. Experts will address how cultural organizations can align with these frameworks to foster systemic change, while also exploring the broader impact of cultural networks in driving sustainability.



Workshops will offer hands-on opportunities for participants to design sustainable cultural projects, integrating considerations of environmental impact, ethical responsibility, and long-term resilience. A critical discussion on eco-ethical dilemmas in arts management will encourage participants to navigate complex decision-making scenarios, addressing real-world challenges in balancing artistic and environmental priorities. Well-being will be another important topic, with a focus on how cultural institutions can promote social and economic sustainability while embedding care, fairness, and justice in their operations. Through this, participants will gain a deeper understanding of the cultural sector's role in fostering resilient and equitable communities.

Complementing these discussions, site visits to cultural initiatives in Bologna will provide real-world examples of sustainability in practice, allowing participants to observe how institutions are implementing environmentally and socially conscious strategies.

Once more, the ENCATC Academy will be possible thanks to the presence and contributions of representatives from political institutions and international experts from the cultural sector.

DISCOVER BOLOGNA: A LEADING CITY IN SUSTAINABILITY AND CULTURE



The hosting city of Bologna stands as a pioneer in sustainability and urban innovation, with a remarkable history of progressive environmental initiatives. As one of the first European cities to experiment with free public transport in the 1980s, the city has been implementing meaningful sustainability projects. It is one of the 100 European cities committed to achieving climate neutrality by 2030 under the EU Mission Climate-Neutral and Smart Cities. Bologna has taken significant steps toward this ambitious goal. The city signed a Climate City Contract, outlining a comprehensive plan for climate neutrality across all sectors, including energy, buildings, waste management, and transport, along with related investment strategies. Considering the importance of cities' engagement to fight climate change - cities consume over 65% of the world's energy and account for more than 70% of global CO₂ emissions - Bologna launched the TALEA initiative, to leave a lasting green footprint on the city. This project focuses on enhancing urban adaptation through improved monitoring and analysis of urban heat islands and related mitigation actions, boosting safety, well-being, and citizen participation in revitalized urban spaces, reimagining underutilized key urban areas, and promoting urban biodiversity.



A series of concrete actions have already been put in place to breathe new life into disused spaces in Bologna. Among these initiatives, the urban regeneration project of the Association "Reuse With Love" stands out as a symbol of the city's effort to rethink urban spaces in a sustainable way. Notably, the Association revitalized the old Enel substation in Giardini Margherita, transforming the space into a cultural center, hosting events, exhibitions, shared spaces, sports equipment lending, and a section dedicated to a university of reuse, showcasing creations from the Reuse workshop.

Among other notable sustainability projects, Giardini Margherita also hosts "Le Serre" (Giardini Greenhouses), a regenerated space and hybrid cultural center, in the area where the former municipal greenhouses once stood. This renewed public space now serves as a home to projects and activities united by a vision of sustainability and collaboration.

DISCOVER BOLOGNA: A LEADING CITY IN SUSTAINABILITY AND CULTURE



From sustainability to culture: Bologna is a vibrant cultural hub where history and modernity coexist harmoniously. The city's medieval heritage meets a forward-thinking spirit, with the portico-lined streets and historic buildings standing as a testament to centuries of rich history. Among the city's most iconic symbols are the Two Towers—the Asinelli and the Garisenda. The latter, in particular, has undergone recent restoration to preserve its historical significance and ensure its continued prominence in the city skyline. Another significant landmark is the Santuario della Madonna di San Luca, a sanctuary that offers a panoramic view of the city and has long been a place of devotion and pilgrimage for both locals and visitors. The arcades (Portici), which define the landscape of Bologna and make the city unique in the world, were recognized as a UNESCO World Heritage site in 2021.



Bologna is also home to the world's oldest university, the University of Bologna, founded in 1088. As a historic center of intellectual thought and innovation, it continues to shape the city's cultural and academic landscape. Visitors can still explore the Archiginnasio, the university's first permanent seat, which today houses an extensive library and preserves the renowned Teatro Anatomico, an extraordinary example of 17th-century medical education.

At the same time, contemporary architecture, such as innovative museums and cultural centers, celebrates Bologna's dynamic spirit of innovation. The city hosts world-class museums, including the "Museo d'Arte Moderna" (MAMbo) and the well-known painter Giorgio Morandi's residence and museum. Through the "Arte Fiera" and "Art City" events, Bologna continues to establish itself as a hub of urban and contemporary creativity. Notably, Italy's leading modern and contemporary art fair, "Arte Fiera 2025," includes a section dedicated to experimental artists, expanding its focus on emerging creativity, alongside a special international hospitality program aimed at foreign museum directors and curators. Meanwhile, "Art City" transforms the entire city into a vibrant hub of creativity, with over 270 events in 2025.

Giannalia Cogliandro Beyens

Giannalia Cogliandro Beyens has been the Secretary General of ENCATC since 2004. She is also the administrator of the Thomassen mobility programme and serves on several boards. Educated at the University "La Sapienza" in Rome, Giannalia holds a Degree in Political Sciences - International Relations and two additional masters in European & International Career Studies, and a M.A. in European Constitution.

Paolo Ferri is an Associate Professor of Accounting and Business Administration at the University of Bologna and the Director of the Graduate Program in Innovation and Organization of Culture and the Arts (GIOCA). His research focuses on change and innovation in accountability systems within complex and professional organizations, with a particular emphasis on cultural institutions such as museums, archaeological and industrial heritage sites, and opera houses. Before becoming an Associate professor at UNIBO, Paolo Ferri worked as Assistant professor at UNIBO (2016-2019), lecturer in Accounting at RMIT University in Melbourne (2015-2016), post-doctoral fellow at Stockholm Business School (2013-2015). He has also taught at Singapore Institute of Management and UPH (Jakarta). Before these experiences, he gained his PhD in Management from the University of Bologna in 2012. He has a master degree in Innovation and Organization of Culture and the Art.



Roberta Ferrarini

PhD Candidate, University of Bologna, Italy

Roberta Ferrarini is a Ph.D. Candidate in the Department of Management, part of the GIOCA Research Group in the field of public management of UNESCO heritage. Currently, she works as an independent researcher for the city of Chemnitz (ECoC 2025) on the project '40 recommendations from 40 years of ECoCs'. Her research interests concern cultural policies applied to world heritage sites, specifically with regard to the case of Venice. Previously, she studied the phenomenon of festivals and cultural events, both as a researcher and as a consultant. Getting to Bologna

AIR TRAVEL

Guglielmo Marconi Airport (BLQ) is the main international airport serving Bologna and deeply committed in green initiatives. Many European cities offer direct flights to Bologna and if you are flying from outside Europe, you may need to connect through a major hub like Rome, Milan or another international airport. Once you arrive, you can easily reach the city center with a Taxi ride that takes about 15-20 minutes. Otherwise, you can take a shuttle bus that connects the airport to Bologna's central train station, taking around 20 minutes.

TRAIN

Bologna centrale is the city's main train station and is located in the heart of the city, which can be convenient. If you are traveling within Italy, you can book tickets on the official Trenitalia website or through other platforms like Italo. If you are traveling internationally, you can check on platforms like Trainline or Interrail for booking options.

BUS

Bologna Autostazione is where most buses arrive and is located near the Bologna Centrale. To book your travel, you can check Flixbus' website, which is one of the most popular bus companies in Europe, or Eurolines' website, another option for international travelers. In Italy, there are also other companies like MarinoBus or BusCenter that provide connections to Bologna.

CAR

Driving distances to Bologna are as follows: 2 hours from Milan, 4 hours from Rome and 1 hour from Florence. In Italy, some places like Bologna have limited traffic zones (ZTL), so be aware of the local rules before entering the city center. Bologna has various parking areas or street parking places, but it remains easier to park at one of the outskirts and use public transport or walk into the center.
